Student Living Index 2016

QUANTITATIVE STUDY AMONG UNIVERSITY STUDENTS IN THE UK

Key Findings

- Portsmouth has topped the Student Living Index charts as the most cost effective city.
- Students in London are paying below the national sample average for rent. Students in Oxford and Cambridge are paying the most.
- Student loans are contributing £161.14 per week four times as much as any other source to a student's income. Parents are the second largest source of income.
- Those in Manchester and Belfast work the most hours part-time, and therefore spend the least time on hobbies and socialising.
- Students in Cambridge and Oxford spend the most time on academic studies in comparison to other regions.
- Studying for a university degree is 35% more stressful than managing money to students; however, the majority of students still enjoy their degree.
- 52% of students find managing their money stressful, yet only 39% of them have a dedicated budget.
- Those studying at London universities spend the most on travel and eating out in comparison to other regions.

Methodology and Sample


Audience: n=2,514 university students living in the UK


Survey period: June 10th - 29th June 2016. Respondents were given a small incentive to take part in an online survey. The survey was unbranded for all respondents.

The student living index: the results. Portsmouth is the most cost-effective city in the UK.









Income across UK cities is varied as students get income from various sources (parents, banks, etc.)







Students make most of their money during term time work. Those in Manchester and Belfast work the most hours.




Q. "On average, how much does each of the following sources contribute to your income during term time each month?" (Income term-time and holiday work)




Q. "On average, how many hours per month do you spend on the following activities?" (Hours spent in part-time work).


Student loans are contributing the most to student income. Parents are the second largest source of income.

Those in Manchester and Belfast work the most hours part-time.





Q. "On average, how many hours per month do you spend on the following activities?"

Those at Oxford and Cambridge spend the most time studying out of all UK universities.







Q. "On average, how many hours per month do you spend on the following activities?"

Q. "On average, how many hours per month do you spend on the following activities?"






Subject choice is the leading factor when considering a university, followed by academic reputation.

How good are students at budgeting?






Studying for a university degree is much more stressful than managing money for students.

Stress of university degree




Stress of managing money



On a scale of 0-10, where 0 is not at all and 10 is completely, how much are you enjoying studying for your university degree?





Hours spent socialising had the largest impact on enjoyment of course.


Average score of enjoying study by weekly hours working



Average score of enjoying study by weekly hours socialising















Students spend more on groceries than on any other item. Spends per category for regions are varied.


Going out - weekly expenditure




