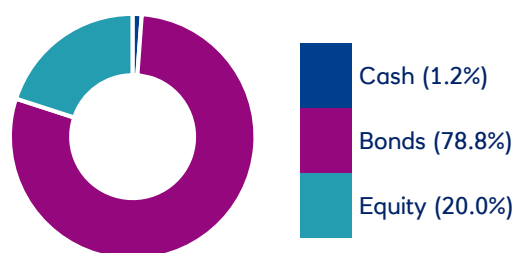
Investment objective

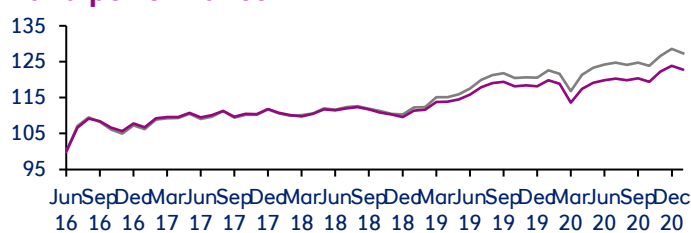

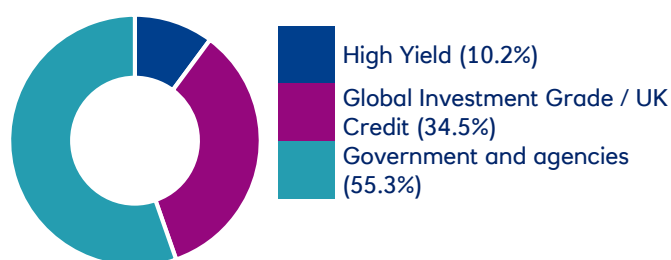

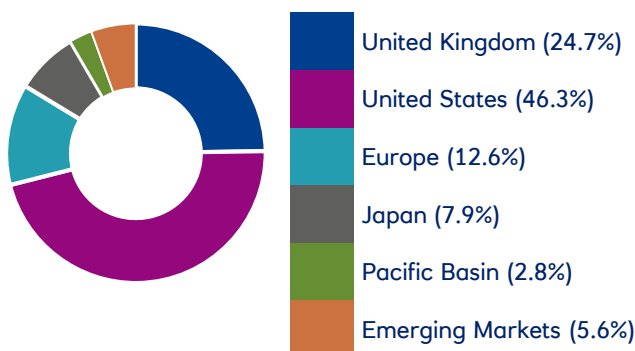
The Fund will mainly be invested in collective investment schemes that are index-tracking rather than actively managed.

Asset breakdown – Bonds



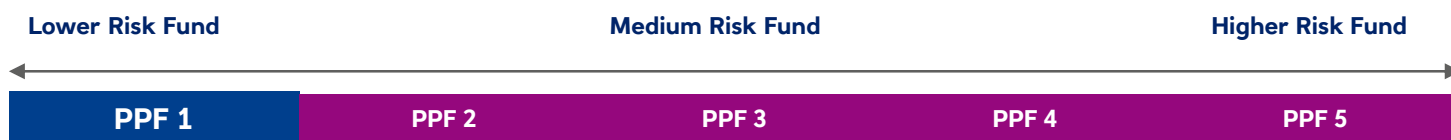
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Asset breakdown – Equities
